1- Funding reform roundtable

The roundtable will gather the participants involved in discussions and implementation of a significant change of the funding model for universities. The goal is to extract good practice and recommendations from systems that have gone through such reforms to support those systems where these processes are either ongoing or being planned. Particular attention will be paid to evolving funding formulae and performance agreements.

2- Governance reform roundtable

Discussions will notably explore the increasing role of external stakeholders in university governance, centralisation vs decentralisation governance models, and the evolving role of board-type governing bodies.
