Digital Scholarship Enablement Strategy

This document outlines the James Hardiman Library's strategy to enable digital scholarship at NUI Galway. The strategy envisages the development of an infrastructure to maximise digital access to, and exploitation of, the Library's archival and special collections, along with the establishment of services and collaborations to support related digital initiatives elsewhere in the University and to participate as a partner in projects locally, nationally and internationally.

At the core of this strategy is a recognition that the Library is only one of many participants in innovative projects focused on collections of digital materials and data on the NUI Galway campus. These include the Moore Institute for the Humanities and Social Studies, Insight @ NUI Galway, the Whitaker Institute for Innovation and Societal Change, Acadamh na hOllscolaíochta Gaeilge and the Huston School of Film and Digital Media. Activities include:

Digital Engagement, Partnerships and Impact

- Open access dissemination of research outputs
- Digitisation and online access to archives
- Participation in **text mining** and data analysis projects
- Hosting of digital collections and **research data** in library repositories
- Provision of **spaces**, tools and equipment for digital creativity
- Location for Library and IT Helpdesk
- Access to 30,000+ online journals via national consortium

1.0 Purpose

To ensure open access to, and long-term preservation of, the University's research outputs to the maximum extent possible.

2.0 Description

NUI Galway is committed to sharing the findings of its research as widely as possible to enhance its use and impact within the academic and research community and more widely within society. The University wants to ensure timely and accurate open access to publicly funded research and to meet the requirements of funder mandates in this regard. It also recognises the research publications of its staff as a major institutional asset whose long-term preservation needs to be ensured.

Open access is an internationally recognised approach to the dissemination of research outputs that complements and extends the established practices and rigorous selection of publications in peer reviewed journals and elsewhere. It makes research outputs accessible free of charge online and without subscription barriers, sometimes after an agreed period has elapsed since initial publication.


Advantages of open access for authors include higher levels of citation, easy discovery through global search engines such as Google and harvesting services like $\underline{\text{Rian}}$, and long-term preservation of outputs. Wider exposure of our research enhances the University's reputation and broadens its international recognition. Research funders achieve maximum public impact.

By publishing an open access policy NUI Galway joins <u>over 500 universities</u> worldwide and supports the *National Principles for Open Access Policy Statement Ireland*¹. This document aligns with European University Association guidelines for institutional policies². It sets out the application of the University's policy, the procedures for achieving open access publication and institutional preservation of publications, the responsibilities of the parties involved and sources of assistance.

At the time of acceptance for publication, please email the full-text file for the final manuscript version to aran@nuigalway.ie


On receipt of your file, the Library will:

- Establish the open access rights specified by the publisher
- Apply appropriate embargoes, copyright and licence statements
- Publish the final manuscript version as soon as possible





Abbey Theatre Digital Archive@NUI Galway: impact


- ✓ Use of the archive has now been embedded into many courses in Drama and English. These include a dedicated MA course called "The Abbey Theatre Digital Archive"
- ✓ The availability of the Abbey and other archives is proving to be a significant strength in recruitment of MA and PHD students
- ✓ The Library and Drama are collaborating on a major **international conference**, "Performing the Archive", to be held in July 2015
- ✓ Drama staff have joined a group of international scholars working on theatre and **digital humanities projects**, leading already to many joint activities, including **funding bids**.
- ✓ NUI Galway academics are **publishing** chapters in the forthcoming *Oxford Handbook of Modern Irish Theatre*, while forthcoming books will feature the archive strongly
- ✓ The exhibition Performing Ireland, 1904-2014: a digital journey through Irish theatre, located at the Hardiman Research Building, engaged wider audiences





New moves in push to Open Access to scholarly journals

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Disclaimer

Two important steps were taken last week in the drive to support the conversion of the majority of today's scholarly journals from subscription only to Open Access.

The Max Planck Society published an Expression of Interest already adopted by 30 signatories, inviting all parties involved in scholarly publishing to collaborate on a "swift and efficient transition for the benefit of scholarship and society at large".

The list of first signatories published on 21 March include, among others, the Austrian Science Fund, the Netherlands Organisation for Scientific Research, and the Spanish National Research Council, as well as the European University Association, the representative organisation of more than 800 universities and 36 national rectors' conferences in 47 European countries.
