#### GLOBAL COMPACT ON MIGRATION

- Adopted in December 2018 by UN Member States. It is the first intergovernmentally negotiated agreement, covering all dimensions of international migration in a holistic and comprehensive manner;
- Member States committed to cooperate internationally to facilitate safe, orderly and regular migration;
- Guided by the 2030 SDGs.

#### **Objective 15**: Provide access to basic services for migrants.

(f) "Provide inclusive and equitable quality education to migrant children and youth, as well as facilitate access to lifelong learning opportunities, including by strengthening the capacities of education systems and by facilitating non-discriminatory access to early childhood development, formal schooling, non-formal education programmes for children for whom the formal system is inaccessible, on-the-job and vocational training, technical education and language training, as well as by fostering partnerships with all stakeholders that can support this endeavor."









# IOM's ACTIVITIES IN THE FIELD OF EDUCATION



IOM is not an education-specialized organization, but a number of its activities are related to education and training, within the scope of larger goals such as integration, reintegration or social cohesion.





The project TandEM – Towards Empowered Migrant Youth in Southern Europe - aims to build a bridge between migrant and local youth to promote dialogue, mutual understanding and cohesion. TandEM focuses on local and migrant youth currently enrolled, or interested in enrolling, in higher education institutions.

A large component of the TandEM project is dedicated to encouraging young southern Europeans to actively contribute to the integration of young migrants through, for example, peer-to-peer student mentorship schemes and youth campaigns.
