- 2,000 pre-tertiary students at Junior College







Our challenges

Only 17% of PhD student cohort is currently on scholarship from the Government (mostly STEM areas) – not enough!

The University will continue to petition local authorities to meet Malta's stated **Research and Development** investment target of 2% of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by 2020. Currently the figure stands at around 0.7% of the GDP (i.e., approx. €85 million instead of €250 million).


Increase the number of COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH DEGREE programmes

- We currently have 17 PhD students on joint programmes – France, The Netherlands, Iceland, Italy
- The UM will be submitting a COFUND application (MSC actions) this year to support Doctoral and Post-Doctoral researchers
